

## The 2010 Health Reform Law Works for Missouri's Small Employers!

Health reform legislation enacted by Congress gives Missouri's small businesses and not for profit organizations – and their workers - more security and choices for affordable health care coverage. Because of the health reform law:

- 79,900 small businesses or not for profits could receive a tax credit to offset their cost of premiums.
  - o Small businesses eligible for these tax credits employ more than 303,000 workers.
  - o Nationally, one-third of the uninsured, 13 million people, work for businesses with fewer than 100 workers.
- Small companies will be better able to attract and retain employees. Workers will be able to move throughout the workforce with a guarantee that affordable health coverage will be available, regardless of employer, full time or part time status, or income.
- 495,000 uninsured Missourians will gain health coverage. Workers with insurance are more likely to get preventive care and treatment when they need it. A healthy work force can increase productivity.
  - More than 80 percent of the uninsured are in working families. Two thirds of the uninsured are from families with one or more full-time workers and 14 percent are from families with part-time workers.
- Insurance companies will not be able to increase insurance rates because employees have a pre-existing condition, genetic conditions, a history of prior insurance claims, are women, or because they do work considered dangerous.
- Small businesses will get the same price benefits on insurance premiums as large employers when insurance "exchanges" are set up and small businesses' employees become part of a large pool.
- Businesses and individuals will have a guarantee that at least 80 percent of the cost of insurance premiums will be spent on health care rather than advertising, administration or profits for investors. If less is spent, insurance companies will have to give rebates to consumers.
- Small businesses may benefit from increased demand for goods and services.
  - Missouri's middle class workers will get the largest tax cut for health care in history by giving tax credits and cost-sharing assistance to low- and middle-income Americans in the exchanges. Their increased income will stimulate increased demand for goods and services.
