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Governor's Vetoes and Restrictions Span Entire Budget Jay Hardenbrook, Director of Public Policy

Governor Nixon today announced over \$144 million in general revenue line item vetoes and restricted another \$641 million from the fiscal year 2015 budget until funds are available. The budget actions resulted from the passage of an unbalanced FY 2015 budget and a flurry of tax cuts passed in the final days of the 2014 legislative session.

As of June 19th, state general revenue for the current fiscal year grew by 0.62 percent for the year to date compared to the previous year – well below the 2.8 percent estimate that was assumed when the current year's budget was developed. In addition, the state faces a backlog in individual income tax refunds, and has delayed payment on these refunds due to cash flow issues. As a result, Missouri is likely to end the budget year \$100-150 million under expected levels.¹

In addition, tax breaks passed on the last day of the legislative session are expected to cost about \$250 million in general revenue in fiscal year 2015. Combined, these dynamics result in significantly less revenue available for services in FY 2015.
